FUNDRAISING NEWS

Mary Crowe was hired to do another short fund raising contract of 6 hours per week for WKWA in May & June. This is her report.

Hi everyone! In the brief time back at the fundraising helm at WKWA, I have followed up on a number of outstanding applications and initiated a couple of new ones. Here's an abbreviated list:

- **RDCK** - \$750 grant application to match \$250 City of Nelson grant received for



Unemployed Women's Drop-In to take place over the summer. Total cost of the project is \$1,000.

CIBC - follow up on computer & phone application of \$5,000 for 2 new computers and a new telephone system that has an intercom facility.

NDCU - Nelson & District Credit Union application for \$1600 to buy the Big Database Internet fundraising unit. This is a very user-friendly and constantly updated system and would help us spread our 'net' much wider. See separate article in this newsletter.

- **BCGC** - B.C. Gaming Commission. Community groups access to funds ends on June 30th, according to their website, so I'm writing an application for one year funding of \$45,000 for the Drop-In & Volunteer Co-ordinator post to be continued next year.
- **Foundation research** - this is a huge area and I have a new list ready for letters of inquiry to be sent out.
- **Letter of Inquiry** - I have written a draft of this letter that will serve as the generic model to be sent to foundations as a preliminary request for information.

- **Vancouver Foundation** - I wrote a letter of inquiry requesting \$135,000 three year funding for the Drop-In & Volunteer Co-ordinator. This foundation gave us a \$5,500 grant in 1995 to furnish the then new Women's Centre.



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The West Kootenay Women's Association News is published 7 times a year, on the following dates: Feb 1, Apr 1, May 15, July 1, Sept 1, Oct 15 & Dec 1. Deadlines for submissions are: Jan 15, Mar 15, Apr 30, Jun 15, Aug 15, Sept 30 & Nov 15 respectively.

The ongoing needs of WKWA to stay out of financial dire straits and maintain a strong and vibrant women's association include long-term fundraising initiatives to ensure a solid base, the Women's Centre, and three-year funding contracts taking place there. I am happy to have been part of this vision to date.

I browsed through the new book section this month and then selected an older (1986) novel by Caeia Marcl solely on the basis th it was published by the Women's Press Fiction. Called *Three Ply Yarn*, it is a tale set in England, a cross-weaving of stories told by three women as they interact/react to one another and the people in their lives, on such topics as sexuality, race, feminism, education, work, class and love. It is a great story, suspenseful, sad and strengthening, told with honesty. Maybe it is about "finding it all from inside us, all the beauty, all the sexual loving. To keep it alive and wonderful, to overcome our fears, to make something new against all odds."

Then I had a look at a beautiful book, *The Dinner Party*, on the multimedia artwork of Judy Chicago. The artwork is made up of a huge, triangular table, set with 39 place settings that "presents a symbolic history of women in Western Civilization". The book explores the idea, the creation, the history of this elaborate piece of art - well worth a look at. (I saw the actual Dinner Party in the early 80s and was awed by the unique and very vulval plates and surroundings. Where is this artwork housed now, I wonder? KXinda)

The last new book I looked at was *Getting Wet*, a collection of short, sizzling tales of lesbian seductions - fun & heart-hitting - (including one by yours truly, K.Linda, written about a small town lesbian community in the mountains!)j


Other Newsy CC Tidbits and Pieces
